

Staying safe when learning at home

We have put together some guidance to help you with learning at home. It can help you to understand our expectations whilst you are learning from home, provide you with information about how to stay physically and mentally well, and give you some useful tips for staying safe online.

Learning at home

Even if you cannot attend school, we want to make sure that you can keep learning, even at home. We have made a work plan for you so that you know how much work we expect you to do, how long you should spend on each task, and how to submit your work.

You will be given a timetable by your class teacher outlining the times that you will be expected to join the Teams video call. Your teacher will call you at these set times and explain what they are expecting you to do. You will then be given some time to complete the activity and you will hand it in once you have completed it on Teams. If you can only do your work on paper, take a photo of it and upload it onto Teams. You will be set a project to complete in the afternoons linked to your foundation subjects. During the afternoons, you will also be timetabled for some time to receive feedback from your class teacher about the work you have completed or are about to complete. This will not be every day but will be clear on your timetable.

Before you begin learning from home, we will make sure you are able to access all of the resources and the equipment you need to do this. If you are worried that you will be unable to access remote learning, speak to your class teacher as soon as possible.

We understand that there will be more distractions at home than in your classroom, so we don't expect you to work a full six hours with no break! It is important that you maintain a routine and ensure you are still learning, even during these circumstances.

Whilst you are learning from home, we expect you to:

- Spend at least one hour on each task we set you (including the tutorial time)
- Complete one reading/phonics, writing, maths and foundation task a day
- Tell your parents or class teacher if you need help with a task
- Send in any work you have completed onto Teams at the end of each day

It is also important that you...

- Take regular breaks from schoolwork and screens
- Follow the timetable that your teacher has given you
- Avoid doing schoolwork in your bedroom.
- Avoid background distractions, e.g. the TV this will make you more productive!
- Contact your teacher on Teams if you are struggling we are available to help!

How to stay well

It is important to make sure you look after your physical and mental health.

To avoid any unnecessary aches and pains, you should make sure you have a sensible place set up to learn from. If possible, you should sit at a table or desk, ensuring your back is supported, rather than laying on your

table or desk, ensuring your back is supported, rather than laying on your bed or the sofa. If you think you are missing any important equipment or a suitable space to work, make sure you speak to your class teacher before you start learning

from home.

If you ever feel unwell or unable to complete the work set, you should tell your parents and make sure you let your class teacher know as soon as possible, ideally before the start of the school day.

You must ensure you also look after your wellbeing while you are at home. To make sure you are staying mentally well, try some of these ideas:

- Get into a routine you could make sure you wake up and go to bed at the same time each day
- Set yourself some achievable tasks you could try a new recipe you've been wanting to try for ages!
- Talk regularly with your friends or extended family you should always talk with your parents about how to set this up
- Stay active try getting out for a walk every day with your family
- Eat normally make sure you have three meals a day at regular times

- Use the time to develop a new skill you could start painting, learn a language or learn how to bake!
- Make sure you get some rest
- Keep your room tidy to make sure you feel relaxed
- Don't do your schoolwork in the evenings or weekends
 you need to balance your home life and school life
- Try not to watch the news too often
- Keep a journal or diary
- Read more often

Staying safe online

If you are spending all day at home, you will likely be spending more time online. Whilst there are many positive aspects of using the internet, such as keeping in contact with those you can't see and staying entertained, you must also remember to use it sensibly.

You are only allowed to message your friends and staff on Teams during school hours, not in the evenings or weekends.

If your internet stops working, complete the tasks on the paper and don't panic! Your teacher will be keeping a register and will phone you if they have not heard from you.

While you are spending more time at home, you should consider the ways you can stay safe and maintain a healthy relationship with the internet by doing the following:

- Having tech-free mealtimes
- Not keeping your phone or tablet in your bedroom
- Before contacting any friends using a device, ensuring you have asked your parents and that they have made sure the right settings have been applied to your account to keep you safe

 If you are contacting anyone by phone or video, make sure you do it in a family space



- Making sure you have the right settings applied to the apps and websites you use, so you don't see anything you don't want to and can limit who can contact to you
- Making sure you know how to report anything on the apps you use most of the popular apps have a reporting function. If you need help with this, please ask your parents
- If you need to report something that you've seen online, ensuring you use Child Exploitation and Online Protection command (CEOP) (<u>https://www.ceop.police.uk/safety-centre/</u>) and the UK Safer Internet Centre (<u>https://www.saferinternet.org.uk/our-helplines</u>)
- Telling your parents if you are worried about anything you have seen online

What to do if you're worried

There may be times when you're feeling worried or concerned about something. You should always tell someone if you feel this way – even if it doesn't seem like an important thing. There are lots of different people you can talk to whilst you're at home, including:

- Parents, carers or someone else in your family.
- Teachers or members of school staff.
- Doctors, nurses or online counsellors.
- Anyone you trust.

If you are finding it difficult to speak to anyone, you can start the conversation with something small, like telling someone what you had for lunch, or what you learnt that day.



Some people find it helpful to write things down in a letter.

We will stay in touch with you whilst you are learning from home, this will be via Teams but if we don't hear from you, we will contact you via your parent's phone number. If there's something that's worrying you, or you want to talk to a specific member of staff who you feel more comfortable with, you can discuss this on the phone call – remember, every worry is relevant, whether it is big or small.

If you are worrying about something relating to a classmate, this is also a very relevant concern. You should always tell a member of staff in this case and we will do what we can to help. We will always let you know if we need to share what you tell us with anyone.
