Message from the Headteacher

Dear Parents/Carers,

We have come to the end of a very busy but productive term and the children and staff have worked extremely hard. This term, the children enjoyed their topics 'This Is Me' and 'My Place, My Time'. After the Christmas break, the children will be enjoying their new learning with their new topic 'Around The World'. Teachers have been busy planning across the Trust and will be sending out Parent Planners with information regarding your child's learning for Spring 1half term.

We had a really successful Early Years and Key Stage 1 Christmas Performance of 'Woops A Daisy Angel'. The children sang, danced and acted brilliantly. There was a collection for a local charity-Homestart and £125 was raised for this charity who support so many of our families at St George's.

The Christmas Fayre went ahead last week despite the awful weather. The St George's Team, together with the children and some wonderful parents set up the Fayre inside the school building instead of outside. Santa was in the warm and Mr Carrette was still able to use the Forest Fire to toast marshmallows and offer hot chocolate in our central Spirituality Garden. We raised a grand total of £610.09 which will be used for resources for the children. We are planning to enhance our school library and reading areas with some quality, diverse texts for the children.

We have had a busy last week at school with Christmas parties, a Christmas lunch for all the children and our Carol Service in church on Friday. It would be lovely to see you in church and we look forward to the choir performing for us.

As you are aware a school priority on the School Development Plan this year is to monitor attendance closely. Mr Harris is writing to the parents/carers of children, whose attendance has fallen below 96% (which is our attendance target). Congratulations to the children who have received a certificate for 100% attendance this week. We are aware that some children have been poorly this term and this absence will be authorised, however it is paramount for you to inform the school if your child is unwell on the first day of their absence.

Physical Education is a core subject and is taught weekly for all children. It is important that all children have their PE kits in school each week and they could stay at school for the full half a term and then they will be sent home to be washed. Please ensure that your child has their PE kit in school each week and with the cold weather, the children continue to have PE outside. I am happy for your child to wear a practical, warm track suit in these cold temperatures. However, if the weather is extreme the PE lesson will be taught inside.

During the Spring term we are planning some Parent/Carer Workshops. These will be in relation to areas of the curriculum, enabling you to support your child's learning, but also in regard to mental health and wellbeing. If you have any further ideas for future Parent/Carer workshops do not hesitate to contact a member of the Senior Leadership Team with your ideas. These are always welcome.

As a school we are planning to relaunch our 'Visible Consistencies'. The staff will be having some training in January with expectations for these 'Visible Consistencies' and then this will be shared with the children on their return to school. Our aim is to have systems in place that are highly effective and utterly consistent across the school. This will impact positively on behaviour and teaching and learning.

Attendance DECEMBER 2022


The target this year is to ensure all children have at least 96.2% attendance.

RECEPTION


Reception have been working super hard over the past few weeks, during their topic of 'What is special about Autumn'.

We enjoyed going on an Autumn walk together around the school and the children loved sharing what they could hear, see and touch, during the walk. They noticed the different colours of the leaves and how some trees have lost their leaves! We collected lots of different things on our walk and then used those natural materials to create our own leaf people, just like the 'Leaf man' by Lois Elhert.



The children have also been working really hard in their 'Talk for Writing' lessons and have really enjoyed learning to retell their key texts, using actions and repeated refrains. Our key texts for this half term so far, have been 'The enormous turnip' and 'Owl babies' and the children have been brilliant at retelling these stories to adults and their friends! This week, we have started 'The Gingerbread man' so please do encourage your child to tell you the story of 'The Gingerbread man' at home - it is guaranteed to make you smile!





Thank you to those of you who are continuing to read and practise Phonics at home with your child and are recording this in their Home School Link Book. Please remember the expectation is to read with your child at home at least **three** times a week. If you ever have any questions about Phonics or Reading and how to support at home, please do not hesitate to talk to Miss Austin or a member of the Reception Team. We enjoyed seeing many of you at our Phonics Workshop on Thursday 1st December. Look out for further workshops in the New Year.

Year 2 thoroughly enjoyed the run up to Christmas. They performed beautifully in the KS1 production.


During this half term they have been creating story maps linked to their narrative driver. Please encourage them to share their stories they have been rehearing and performing in class.


The Year 2 Team

In Year 3, we have been working hard across all of the subjects in our curriculum during the second half of our Autumn topic, My place, My time. I have been really pleased with the general attitude of the class as we have adapted and adjusted to Key Stage 2 work. I'm sure this will continue for the rest of the year and I am excited to see how much we can do, moving forward into 2023!

In our Reading lessons, we are coming to the end of our comprehension topic where we have been using the 'Read Write Ink' booklets to reinforce our 'find it' and 'prove it' skills. These booklets have covered a range of fiction and non-fiction texts and required us to read aloud, and digest different types of information








In writing, we have explored 3 different narrative drivers – Stone Age Boy, How to Wash a Wooley Mammoth and The Tunnel. When we investigated Stone Age Boy, we were able to introduce our starting history topic through narrative and explore our language skills by writing a diary. The How to Wash a Wooley Mammoth text has allowed us to practice our instructional writing including the use of Imperative Verbs and written organisational strategies. We ended the topic with a piece of independent writing. The tunnel has allowed us to channel our inner authors and have a go at writing predictions, alternative endings and examine different texts to allow us to compare and contrast them.

In Maths we have made great progress on our Multiplicatio and Division topic and are getting more and more confident and working without the need of concrete resourses. We have looked at the use of our 2 and 3x table and began to reflect on how we can use our knowledge of inverse opperations to help us understand some simple division questions

In PE we have left football and instead practiced our throwing and catching skills, as well as our spacial awareness to enable us to begin to have some rather competitive games of hand ball!

In science, we have continued our topic of Animals including Humans to look at the necessary aspects which mammels need to survive, such as shelter, food and water



In our topic lessons, we have kept up our Geography work on rivers and water cycles while also beginning our exciting History topic, using prior knowledge that we have gained from our Writing work. This has allowed us to begin to populate our new History scrap books which we will be keeping with us as we move up through the school and look at time periods in a chronological order.

We're looking forward to our Christmas break but can't wait to get back to work! Over the Christmas period, and indeed, as much as possible normally, please read to/with your child to aid them in their academic journey.

The Year 3 Team – Mr Bell and Miss Steward

In Year 4, we have been working really hard in all of our subjects across the curriculum. I am so proud of how much the Year 4 class have already matured and excited to see what we can do with the rest of the year to come!

In our Reading lessons, we have looked at a variety of texts including fiction and non-fiction where we have backed up all of our explainations using the expert tips. We have travelled to a variety of places in the world where we have discovered stalactites, stalagmites and even dragons!



In our Writing, we have been exploring some visual literacy called 'The Dream Giver'. At first we weren't sure what to make of this character and we made lots of great predictions about who we thought he was, where he came from and whether we thought he was good or bad. Thankfully, we learnt that he was really friendly and all he wants to do is give good dreams to all the children. We looked at the Year 4 objectives where we incorporated expanded noun phrases into our writing as well as prepositions, personifcations and adverbs.



In Maths we have recently moved onto Multiplication and Division which has been a huge step from Year 3 to Year 4 as the children have had to use there times tables knowledge for all their work. We have looked at commutativity, using the inverse to check our calculations as well as word problems to problem solve. We have been using concrete and pictoral apparatus such as cubes, base 10 and Numicon to help see the patterns and relationships between numbers which has been really useful for lots of the childrens undertsanding.

In Science, we have looked at living things and their habitats. As scientists, we have explored how living things can be grouped in different ways such as vertebrates, teeth, predators, carnivores, flowering and evergreen. We looked at a classification key to help us identify and name a variety of living things as well as the environments and how they can change which can pose dangers to living things.

In PE, we have learnt how to develop our skills and knowledge of handball as well as our amazing swimming skills at Holy Trimity on a Tuesday. Mr Bell (the Year 3 teacher) has been telling me how amazing the class have been and that everyone has been working really hard to push themselves to the best of their ability.

In addition, please ensure you continue to read with your child at home at least 3 x per week.



Year 5 have been working extremely hard, I am really proud of them and they should be really proud of themselves during our topic of My Place, My Time.

In Reading, we have continued to use our expert tips to decode and explore a range of exciting fiction and non-fiction texts.

In Writing, we have explored the different examples of figurative language and how they can be used to add detail to characters and setting based upon the short visual clip 'The Lighthouse Keeper'. We have then moved onto The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe by C.S Lewis. We have started to reflect on the relationship between Mr Tumnus and Lucy, through the conversations they have. To prepare us to start describing setting, we have been exploring what makes an impactful and purposeful description, we were given different settings and had to describe them to our partner so they could draw it – it was tricky.



In Maths we have moved onto Multiplication and Division and have been using cubes and multiplication squares to explore factors, multiples and the relationships between them.

In Science, we have continued our topic of different life cycles including amphibians, birds and insects.

In PE, we have continued our hockey lessons, we have continued to work on our attacking and defensive skills which have been applied to numerous game-based scenarios. Please continue to support our PE days which are still Monday and Tuesday.

In addition, please ensure you continue to read with your child at home at least 3 x per week.




Wow, what a month Year 6 have had. The children are really beginning to show maturity in their approach to learning and they are making some great strides as we enter a SATS year in 2023!


