Message from the Headteacher

Dear Parents/Carers,

It has been a busy start to the Spring term however the children have settled well into their routines. As a school we have been revisiting our 'Show Me Five' throughout the school day and this has resulted in clear, consistent expectations for all our children. Please ask your child about 'Show Me Five' and how we use them for our behaviour and our learning.

Recently, we had a review to assess our 'Reading Offer' at St George's. Many strengths were identified including the positive impact on our systematic, synthetic phonic programme taught daily in Early Years and Key Stage 1. Furthermore, it was recognised that now we have purchased the Accelerated Reader Programme for Key Stage 2, children across the school are able to choose books that are matched to their reading ability. Books across the school have been coded and children, after an assessment, are able to select a book that is appropriate for them. We have enhanced our reading offer by purchasing a selection of books written by a variety of authors to reflect diversity.

A point for reference is for school to work with parents/carers to encourage reading at home. Mr Harris, our Reading Leader is launching a whole school reward system to encourage all our pupils to read at least three times a week. Each class has a reading challenge and love to move across the challenge board to achieve success. Please support us with reading at home.

Our Educational Mental Health Practitioner, Lorena, continues to support children across the school. She has been delivering a range of workshops to promote positive mental health and wellbeing. Lorena has introduced 'Rainbow Breathing' which is used daily to encourage children to relax and use their breathing to regulate their emotions. It would be lovely to encourage your child to teach you this technique. We are looking forward to Lorena sharing some new breathing and relaxation techniques in the future.

The staff are in the process of arranging some after school activities for the children. There will be details to follow when the staff have finalised the activities.

The Year one children are looking forward to taking part in swimming activities after half term. The letter with all the detail will be sent out from Mr.Carrette this week. The other Year groups have enjoyed gaining confidence in the water and it would be really beneficial if you continue to visit the swimming bathes on a regular basis to encourage water safety.

There is a Year one Parent/Carer phonic workshop being planned for the morning of 13th February. The workshop will begin at approximately 9.00am when you have dropped your child off at school. Please sign in via the main school office. The workshop has been organised to inform you about the Year one phonic screening which will be taking place during the summer term. Any parent of a child who did not pass the phonic assessment last year or did not take the screening assessment will be invited too. Please try and attend this important workshop as it is very important. We are always keen to support parents with knowledge and resources, so if you have any further ideas regarding future workshops, do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher or a member of the Senior Leadership Team.

Attendance for the month of January was 91.62%.



We will be sending out an attendance newsletter outlining everything you need to know about attendance at St George's- keep a look out!



RECEPTION

Reception have had a really good start to the new year and have continued to settle in well after the Christmas break. The children have been very busy in their learning! Here are just some of the things we have been up to...

In Talk4Writing, we have explored the key texts of 'Rosie's walk' and 'Mr Gumpy's Outing'. The children become really familiar with our key texts and we use lots of story retelling and hands-on activities, like role play and puppets to facilitate this.



In Topic, we have learnt all about our locality and the community surrounding St. George's. We started by discussing the different features in our



school and created large-scale maps and constructions

from this, before we then went on to explore the different buildings and places surrounding our school, like St. George's church, St. George's Park and shops etc. The children really enjoyed creating maps of their locality.



The children are continuing to work really hard in their Phonics sessions and we are super proud of the progress they have made with learning their Set 1 sounds and their abilities to segment and blend sounds in simple words to read! Thank you to all of you at home, who are continuing to read with and support your child with Phonics at home. Please could I remind you that your child's Home-School Link Book should be sent into school with your child, **every day**.

Over the next few weeks, we are having a big push on recognising the first six 'Special Friends' in Read Write Inc. These sounds are digraphs (where two letters, make one sound); ng, th, sh, qu, ch and nk. These sounds will be sent home, so you and your child can practise recognising these at home too! 


Year 2 have been using a version of the traditional tale Hansel and Gretel, written by our focus author Anthony Browne. We have been using the key principles of Talk for Writing to enhance and improve our story telling skills. By orally rehearsing sentences and creating story maps to help tell the story before we begin writing, we have improved communication skills alongside our writing. We have focused on story structure, character development and using adjectives to create detail.


Our Maths curriculum has so far covered multiplication and recognising and using money and we will be further consolidating our knowledge and application of Addition and Subtraction.

Year 2 have also explored and investigated Aboriginal Art, looking at cave paintings and symbols to tell stories and convey messages, we have begun to use colour and pattern to create our Aboriginal designs.

This term we began swimming on Tuesday afternoons, an important life skill and fantastic experience for our young learners. We are making great progress; conquering our fear of the water, developing our swimming techniques, and learning to float and dive under water. In addition to this, we are learning gymnastics.












In Year 3 we have had an excellent start to the year, embracing the new visible consistencies which have been deployed throughout the school and I am proud at how quickly the Year 3 pupils have adapted to the change of routines.

In our Reading lessons, we have left behind the comprehension booklets from RWInc and began to investigate and analyse the novel 'The Diary of a Killer Cat' by Anne Fine (who is one of our class authors). The children have been enthusiastic to use their expert tips to find clues in texts, search for definitions in dictionaries and predict what Tuffy the cat will get up to.



In Writing, we have used the narrative driver, 'The Promise' by Nicola Davies, to provide us with some very descriptive adjectives from which we were able to build a detailed picture. We discussed how a promise can help to persuade and began to investigate the best ways to persuade someone to do/think as we wished. We took inspiration from the book and ventured into the sensory garden where we felt it needed to be improved. Thus, we started drafting persuasive letters for what needed to be done to turn the "shrivelled dead leaves" into a paradise of "leafy visions".



In Maths, we have just completed our second unit of work on Multiplication and Division where we looked at dividing numbers that left a remainder!

In Science we are researching the different properties of rocks and drawing connections between this and our work on rivers in Geography. We have begun to look at how some rocks can be eroded faster than others.

In Geography, we have begun to research the river Nile and its path through Africa, consolidating our knowledge of rivers and reflecting on the impacts that they have, on both human and physical geographical features.



We have been very lucky this year to have the opportunity to start to learn the basics of playing the violin. This has been something that we have all loved!

In PE this term, we have been embracing our creative sides and constructing our own games, slowly incorporating more equipment into them to make the games more advanced and enjoyable. We particularly enjoyed joining up with other groups to teach them how to play our games.

Please note that reading books are changed every Monday and it is the expectation that pupils read at home at least 3 times weekly and that this is recorded in the home /school link book. Spellings are also added to this book every Monday and children are tested on them at the end of the week. In addition, the homework is released on Monday and collected on Fridays. This work is important to embed key skills which are vital for progression in school. Both homework books and reader books are checked regularly, and we urge you to support your child to complete these by the respective deadlines.



Year 4 have been working really hard this half term and we have been using our Expert Tips across the curriculum to help us explore new vocabulary, make connections and much much more.


In our Reading lesson, we have been exploring the story 'Journey To The Centre Of The Earth' where we have made some fantastic predictions, explored vocabulary by acting out Professor Liedenbrock's 'stride' and have written their own book review.



In Maths, we have had an emphasis on our timetables as the Year 4 timetables assessments are not too far away now. We have been looking at patterns in the timetables to help us remember them more, as well as starting to practise them during our morning mission time. Currently, we are looking at length and perimeter and the children have really understood the comparison of

1000 metres= 1km.


In Writing, we have been looking at both fiction and non-fiction in our book 'Until I Met Dudley'. We have looked at the language features used by the author and have then created our own explanation of a 'cat feeding machine'. After adopting the same non-fiction language features, we thought we would have a go at writing how a star catching machine would work, allowing us to use our imaginations to create a fictional piece of writing.



In PE I have been so proud of how the children have matured where they can be seen problem solving and working hard to learn the lessons skills. We are currently looking at volleyball and gymnastics. Can I remind the children that volleyball lessons take part outside and it can be quite cold at the moment so please ensure your child has a warm sweatshirt/tracksuit. Gymnastics is taught inside and the children must wear their school PE kit/or similar, in order to take part.

Suitable PE kits should be worn to ensure the child's safety on apparatus.

In Science we had an exciting visitor who came to talk to us about electricity, how we should respect it but also what amazing things we can do with it. We looked at open and closed circuits using wires as well as our bodies. We used terminology such as conductors (allows electricity to pass through it like our bodies being predominantly water) and insulators which stops electricity passing (such as rubber and wood. The children had so much fun trying on his very own uniform that he needs daily to stay safe



Reading books are looked at every Monday and it is the expectation that pupils read at home at least 3 times weekly and that this is recorded in the home link diary. As the children are given more responsibility in Year 4, they can write in their diary themselves and it is their responsibility to remember it too.

Year 5 has been working really hard coming back from the Christmas break. We started with looking at our New Year goals for 2023 and how we can apply that to our positive classroom ethos. We also introduced our important 5 visible consistencies which is expected to be always shown and represented throughout the school.

In Reading, we started the class text 'Holes' by Louis Sanchar, where we have met the character Stanley and follow his journey at the juvenile centre for 'bad boys' Camp Green Lake. We started off the topic by predicting what the story was about using the title and front cover.

In Writing, our text focus is 'The Princess' Blankets', which is a story about a Princess who spends her days cold and can never warm up. We are looking at how to persuade and are leading up to write a speech from the King to ask the kingdom to support the royal family in finding a cure. We have applied modal verbs to create a 'Dragon's den' style pitch where the children came up with their own ideas to warm up the princess. We have also looked at relative clauses and emotive language to start to prepare for our speech, ensuring that the kingdom feels sorry for the princess and therefore needs to help her.







In Maths, we have started the topic of fractions, during this time we have been looking at finding equivalent fractions, converting mixed numbers to improper fractions, converting improper fractions to mixed numbers, comparing/ordering fractions and adding/subtracting fractions. All

children have kept a fraction wall in their maths books and have referred to these where necessary.

In Science, we have started our topic of Earth and Space. We have been introduced to the different plans in our solar system and had class debates on whether the Earth was flat or spherical using scientific evidence. We have also looked at phases of the moon, we used Oreos to represent this (and of course we got to eat some).



Please continue to talk with your children about what they get up to at school, this contributes embedding their learning and deepens their understanding. Please ensure you are reading with your children AT LEAST 3x per week and practising their spellings daily.

Monday and Tuesday is still our PE days and please continue to bring Forest School clothes on Friday.
