
Attendance





January has been an exciting month in Reception, full of curiosity, creativity and exploration.



The children used their observations to include important buildings and places they know well. Their maps included roads, streets and houses and we were really impressed by their attention to detail.



To inspire our love of reading and learn some more about our local area, we loved our trip to the library. The children enjoyed walking to the library, talking about the different buildings around them and they also loved exploring the different sections of the library and listened to a story.



Next month, we are looking forward to learning about Africa. We will be exploring the continent using books such as *Handa's Surprise*, learning about different places, animals and cultures, making comparisons with our own lives. YEAR 1

Year 1 have had a great start to the new year, and we are all proud of the children for how they have settled back in after the break!

In writing, we have been busy writing stories based on 'Lost and Found' by Oliver Jeffers and 'Be Brave Little Penguin!' by Giles Andreae. We have enjoyed exploring our new Antarctic roleplay area and retelling the story.



In maths we have been adding and subtracting using 'first, then, now' stories. Ask your child if they can tell you a 'first, then, now' story! We are always busy practicing our number bonds to 10 and our odd and even numbers to 20!

Please ensure PE kits are in every **Wednesday**!



YEAR 2

Year 2 have had a wonderful few weeks of learning and the children have been working incredibly hard across all subjects.

In Maths, we have been exploring *multiplication* and *division*. The children have been using counters, cubes and pictures to help them make equal groups, share amounts out equally, and understand what the symbols \times and \div mean.



In Writing, we have continued our work on *The Snail and the Whale*. We have been learning about different types of past tense, using conjunctions such as **because**, **or** and **so**, and practising our storyteller voices. The children have also changed the main character in the story so they can plan and write their own version of the adventure. Their ideas and creativity have been fantastic!

In Geography, we have been finding out where Jamaica is on the map and comparing its weather and climate to ours in the UK. We explored the types of food that grow in Jamaica because of the warm climate, and learned about the journey a banana takes from a farm in Jamaica all the way to our supermarkets. The children were fascinated to see how far it travels!

In PSHE, we have been learning how to look after our *health and wellbeing*. We have talked about how exercise and breathing can help us feel calm and focused, and discussed why it is important to keep trying even when something feels tricky. The children have shown great resilience and positivity in their learning.

In Science, we have been exploring the different habitats around our school grounds. We carried out a survey to see which animals we could find in different areas around school.

We are very proud of the enthusiasm and effort Year 2 have shown in their learning!

Please continue to read with your child at home as much as possible and record this in their reading record.

Please make sure PE kits are in school every **Monday and Friday**. If your child has earrings, then please provide tape to cover them or remove them on these days. 😊

YEAR 3

Year 3 have had a fantastic start to the spring term, and the children have shown great enthusiasm for their learning across all subjects.

In Writing, we are enjoying the text *A River* and are working towards writing a setting description. The children are learning how to use expanded noun phrases and prepositions, linking this work to our Geography topic on rivers.

In Maths, the children have been working hard on formal methods for multiplication and division, and it has been wonderful to see their growing confidence and understanding. In Reading, the class have been completely captivated by our class novel *The Girl Who Stole an Elephant* by Nizrana Farook, which has sparked lots of thoughtful discussion.

In Science, we have begun our new topic on rocks, where the children are learning about different types and their properties. In Art, we have started exploring the work of print artist William Morris. The children will be experimenting with printing using objects found around the school and, by the end of the unit, are very excited to design and create their own nature-inspired prints, influenced by William Morris and the artist Lynn Bailey.



In French, Year 3 have really enjoyed learning about different colours and shapes. We have now begun learning numbers and, so far, the children have learned numbers up to six. The children particularly enjoyed playing games to help them practise and build confidence with this new vocabulary.

Our PE lessons take place every **Monday** and **Thursday**. Please ensure that your child brings their PE kit to school on these days and can remove any jewellery they are wearing. If earrings cannot be removed, kindly provide tape for them to cover the earrings. Additionally, please make sure that long hair is tied back for these sessions.

In KS2, students are expected to read at least five times per week. Those who meet this goal will be entered into a special reading raffle, giving them the chance to win a prize.

YEAR 4

Year 4 have been working super hard this Spring. The children have been challenging themselves to improve their work, and something we have taken a real focus on is our handwriting. We have been revisiting and reactivating our knowledge of letter formation.

The classroom continues to be a really lovely environment, and all the children are feeling happy with their learning together. In Writing, we have been exploring *The Lost Thing* by Shaun Tan, which has linked nicely with our discussions around creativity and imagination. We have been creating newspaper reports using key language features, including expanded noun phrases and a range of conjunctions. There have also been lots of brilliant conversations about emotions and how we can express them effectively in our writing. The children have really enjoyed experimenting with language and sharing their ideas.

In Maths, we have been exploring division, and the inverse relationship with multiplication has been incredibly useful. We continue to build our confidence with times tables as we strengthen our knowledge in preparation for the Year 4 Multiplication Tables Check. From our multiplication work, we have begun to look more deeply into division and how these operations link as inverses of each other.

In Reading, we have continued to use *Comprehension Express* to help us become more confident and thoughtful readers. We are learning how to use our Expert Tips to answer questions carefully and to explain our thinking clearly. By reading a variety of class texts, we have had lots of rich discussions, and we are developing ways to understand what we read more effectively. The book we are currently enjoying is *Mr and Mrs Twit*, which has sparked plenty of lively conversations!

In Science, we have begun our topic on living things and their habitats. As scientists, we have been exploring our school grounds, observing the wildlife around us, and learning how to classify living things. We began by looking at vertebrates and invertebrates, and we are now continuing to develop our own classification keys.

In PE, we have focused on gymnastics looking and transitioning from one balance to another whilst incorporating a roll and in Outdoor Adventurous Activity we have looked at building on our teamwork skills.

YEAR 5W

This term has begun with lots of excitement across our English, science, and geography lessons!

In **reading**, we have started reading *Varjak Paw*, exploring the adventurous world of a young Mesopotamian Blue cat who steps far beyond the safety of his home. The children are already making thoughtful predictions and connections, and we are looking forward to watching their enthusiasm grow as the story unfolds.



Alongside this, we have begun writing setting descriptions inspired by the atmospheric opening of *Ice Trap!* Pupils have been using powerful vocabulary and sensory details to bring icy, dramatic landscapes to life.



In **science**, we launched our new **Space** unit. The children have been fascinated by early scientific ideas, including Aristotle's theory that the Earth is spherical. We discussed the clues and observations he used—such as the 'disappearing ship' theory—and how his ideas helped shape our understanding of the planet we live on.


Our new **geography** topic is all about **natural disasters**. We have started this unit by looking at how we can use lines of longitude and latitude to find a place. We will continue to explore what natural disasters are, where they occur, and how they affect people and environments around the world. It's been an inspiring start to the term, and we're excited to continue building knowledge, skills, and curiosity in the weeks ahead.

YEAR 5CM

The children have worked enthusiastically on writing a vivid setting description, developing their ideas through rich and imaginative language. As they wrote, they improved their understanding of similes and metaphors, learning how comparisons could help the reader picture the scene more clearly and bring the setting to life. Alongside this, the children practised using brackets to show extra information, adding detail and clarification without interrupting the flow of their writing.



As artists, the children have enjoyed creating fantastic paintings inspired by Henri Rousseau's *Surprise*. With careful thought and imagination, they each chose an animal to place within a jungle setting, using different hue families to create their final piece. The children took pride in their creations, producing expressive and vibrant artworks that reflected both their enjoyment of the process and their growing understanding of artistic inspiration.



5CM thoroughly enjoy their PE lessons, we have practised controlling the ball, passing accurately, and are looking forward to playing small games and are growing more confident each lesson. Alongside this, the children are equally excited to attend their swimming lessons, where they develop their water confidence and improve their swimming skills through structured activities and challenges. Both experiences support their physical development and encourage a positive attitude towards staying active and trying new sports.



YEAR 6



We have been working very hard in Year 6 this term and it's been busy!

In our writing, we have used an animation called Francis as our inspiration to create short suspense stories that leave our readers asking questions. We have continued to develop our knowledge of using clause types for effect as well as using figurative language to create suspense. The class have been using the zone of relevance to examine the impact of their own and others' work.

In maths, we have focused on fractions, including the four operations and developed our skills to problem solve. We are just beginning to move onto percentages, looking at equivalency between fractions, decimals and percentages. The class have also been working hard in their extra arithmetic lessons, and this has been showing during their practise arithmetic papers.

In history, we are learning about the English Civil War. We have been comparing our new learning to our previous learning about King John and how King Charles I made similar choices to him.

The class will be focusing on pointillism in art later this term, which is a technique created by the artist Georges Seurat.



AMELIA'S STORY 

In 2020, Amelia was diagnosed with stage 4 neuroblastoma. She went through 23 months of intensive treatment, including chemotherapy, immunotherapy, radiotherapy and high-dose chemotherapy. After reaching a stable condition, the cancer returned twice, even after taking part in clinical trials. Amelia is now receiving palliative care. 

Amelia Kolpa, from Rowley Regis in the Black Country, has neuroblastoma and has been in and out of hospital since the age of two and a half.

To mark her eighth birthday on 3rd of March, Amelia is hoping to break the record for the most birthday cards received in the UK, by hitting the 8,000 cards mark.

Now, her family have issued an appeal to help make Amelia's wish come true.
